## Schools Value Reuse Materials

As summer ends and school begins, students across Nebraska embark on another year of classes and school activities. Their supplies purchased, the remainder sit in store clearance bins, freeing space for the ever-expanding Christmas season. Schools also have budgeted supplies, but even those with a little space to maneuver can't necessarily replace worn out equipment and furnishings. To maximize that wiggle-room, reuse savvy administrators and teachers alike often turn to the Materials Exchange.

For years, Exchange participants have generated material that schools find useful. In 1999 for instance, the Spring Issue of **The Link** told of a parochial high school running short of building funds. In need of 180 student desks, an Exchange participant answered the call, saving them some \$10,000. In the 8 1/2 years since, another 291 desks have found homes in Nebraska schools. In all, state K-12 schools, Districts and Educational Service Units (ESU) have been on the receiving end of over 220 matches, totaling more than 118 tons of needed material. From desks and chairs to computers and craft supplies, Exchange generators have saved schools an estimated \$137,000.

The biggest success in terms of weight has been the more than 50 tons of multi-colored adhesive film collected by an ESU. Essentially rolls of paper-backed sticker material, it's been put to a variety of class and office uses by area schools and teachers. Valued at a penny per pound, it has surely saved recipients more than that.

Schools in Lancaster County have picked up more than 82 gallons of free paint over the years. A gallon of paint goes a long way to brightening a classroom, and even at a conservative \$10 per gallon, the money saved buys a whole lot of pens and markers. Availability does vary, but at least 2 generators consistently have several gallons on hand.

Small reuse items can also add up to big savings. Twelve schools or systems have received over 850 3-ring binders. Another has picked up some 200 5-gallon plastic bottles over the years. Additionally, 6 different schools have utilized some 20,000 zip-lock bags, and 5 others have received 100 boxes of file folders. Conservatively valued, the items add up to \$2990 in savings – not a huge amount of money, but enough to buy another 100 reams of office paper.

As beneficial as that is, consider the savings represented by the file cabinets the folders and paper

go in. To date, 9 schools have gotten 57 cabinets (including 20 of the large lateral variety) for an estimated savings of nearly \$14,000 as compared to new. In addition, schools have picked up 25 office/teacher desks, 52 chairs, and 3 conference tables from participating generators.

While the successes are rewarding, the Exchange currently has 23 schools with 52 active listings that remain unmatched. A variety of items are sought, including a majority of those already mentioned. Others include small items like burlap bags, custodial supplies, and paper, as well as big-ticket items like lockers, projectors, and shop equipment. We even have a school that could really use a gym floor, but can't afford to purchase one outright.

Many of these listings have been posted on the Exchange for years without a match. While some are for material rarely generated by participants, others remain unmatched due to location and cost of transportation. While definitely a hindrance, with a

little networking and patience, creative solutions can be found. As one might imagine, the majority of materials are generated in the Lincoln and Omaha areas making matches with schools in the west difficult. Although generators don't want to keep items on warehouse shelves

indefinitely, many would be happy to work with schools that can't pick something up right away.

Cooperation between schools, districts, and ESU's could work for the benefit of all. High School sporting events and tournaments require team travel to or from Lincoln and Omaha every year. Materials they could fit in a bus would greatly reduce transportation costs if not eliminate them entirely. Matches made in the fall could also benefit from Husker football. One would think that most communities have somebody coming to Lincoln for a Husker game or two each year. Continuing education, or other seminars like the technology conference held in Omaha each spring, might also provide an opportunity for picking up material.

That said the best solution to transportation problems is always to keep it local. The Materials Exchange encourages businesses throughout the state to clear out warehouse space and list reusable materials that schools in their area may need. While proximity is always a key factor for Exchange facilitators, generators are free to request that local schools be contacted first.

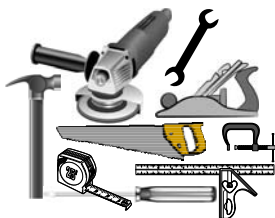

**Home Furnishings Needed for New Americans**

For some 30 years, Lincoln has played an important role in helping refugees from around the world make a fresh start. In coming months, dozens of Burmese refugees landing on American soil for the first time will also call the capital city home. While several organizations and agencies are prepared to welcome and help them get settled, one in particular has taken on the task of locating any household items they will need. Furniture for every room tops the list, followed by kitchen gear, linens, and cleaning supplies. In short, any and all household necessities are being sought. **To Earth You Shall Return**

Diatomaceous earth is a soft sedimentary substance made up of the fossilized remains of a hard-shelled algae called diatoms (pictured at left). Resembling a

chalky powder rather than dirt, it is often used as a mild abrasive, a filtration aid, and a liquid absorbent. The Exchange participant generating the material uses it as a filter in the production of fructose. At a waste stream rate of 100 tons per month, it's one of the largest unmatched listings on the Exchange. Dry when disposed of, the large volume renders it restricted for use by industrial seekers only. Interested parties are encouraged to contact the Exchange for details. Samples can also be made available upon request.

**Not Throwing in the Towel**

A worldwide manufacturer with facilities in Nebraska generates a thick paper towel-like, polypropylene-based material totaling 150 tons per year.



Since 2003 they've had an ongoing match with a concrete lawn ornament maker in North Dakota for use as padding. While beneficial to both parties, the ornament company can't even begin to use all of the product available. Given the large amounts involved, inquiries are limited to other manufacturers, with an additional caveat on use due to patent restrictions. Accepted seekers would also gain access to similar amounts in neighboring states as well. Interested parties can get contact information or samples through the Exchange, but discussions concerning use restrictions need to be held directly with the generator.

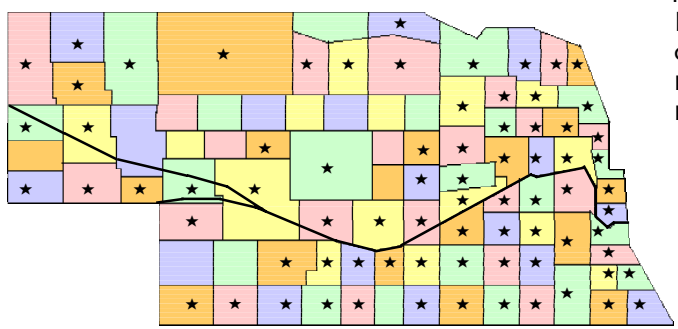

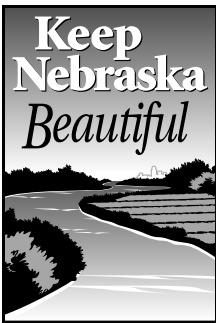
